



How to care for your new wood furniture

It's always an exciting feeling receiving a new piece of furniture to spruce up a home. Here's how to clean and maintain your new natural live edge furniture to get the most out of it.

1. Dust

Microfibre towels are soft enough that they won't scratch or damage the surface of the wood. Their fibres work well to get in any nooks or crevices and fish out dust.

- ☞ Wipe in direction of the grain.
- ☞ Once the cloth is completely soiled, clean with lukewarm water and mild detergent and air dry.

2. Clean

Most natural cleaning products* are absent of any harsh cleaning chemicals, and can leave your furniture squeaky clean by lifting any grime without any streaks or drips.

- ☞ Follow instructions to prepare cleaning product
- ☞ Using a soft, microfibre cloth, wipe in the direction of the grain.
- ☞ Wring cloth nearly dry, and wipe again in the area.
- ☞ Wipe dry with another clean, soft cloth.

3. Polish

Give your furniture a natural glow by applying Tung Oil or Linseed Oil seasonally. Polishing can resist fading and discolouration from sunlight, as well as prevent water from entering under cuts or dings that may have occurred by sealing minor scratches.

- ☞ Shake can well.
- ☞ Wipe in direction of the grain.

4. Maintain

Avoid direct exposure to sunlight or heat. Wooden slabs can become sun bleached if left outside in the sun all day, every day. Use coasters for hot food and drink items to avoid heat marks.

Avoid using the slab for food prep. The finish is not suitable for food preparation, we recommend using separate cutting boards for any cutting or chopping related activities.

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* First test your natural cleaning products on a hidden area to ensure they are suitable for use on your furniture.

The use of harsh cleaning chemicals such as bleach, or hospital grade cleaning products can cause a chemical reaction with the finishing, leading to discolouration and compromise the water resistance of the slab.

Also, avoid using metal scourers as this will damage and scratch the surface. Non-scratch sponges should also be avoided.
